Learning Objectives:

In our everyday lives we encounter many diverse viewpoints held and expressed by the people we come in contact with. While some of those views might seem wrong to us, we do realize that those same views might (and do) appear right to others. The line demarcating the right from the wrong is often not as clear as we would like to imagine. Oftentimes, we have to decide between alternatives whose rightness or wrongness cannot (and should not) be determined through superficial evaluations. How shall we determine and choose the 'right' path in such situations? How shall we practice ethical decision making? Practicing ethical decision making can not only help us maintain a supportive and empathetic organizational culture — be it in an academic setting or beyond — but also fortify our values and boost social & communal wellbeing.

The primary objective of this interdisciplinary add-on course is to help build a robust foundation for independent critical thinking around common ethical questions and decision points and to provide participants (young adults) with social and emotional learning. Through a general discussion of literary texts (serving as case studies) alongside introductory lectures on ethics & morality, this add-on course seeks to expose participants to contrasting viewpoints, encouraging them to develop and hone their critical thinking skills. Besides, it also seeks to sensitize them to the dangers of faulty rationalization and to better prepare them for bigger and more complex life issues.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, participants will be able to:

- integrate classroom learning with bigger and more general life issues
- make more ethically-informed choices
- have a firmer grasp over the rationale of decision making and apply the knowledge in everyday contexts
- become more aware, empathetic, conscientious, and responsible citizens

Evaluation Method:

Following the successful completion of 30 hours' of teaching (contact class), participants will be evaluated through a test conducted in the contact/ offline mode.

The **50-marks test** consists of **2 Modules** comprising <u>25 marks each</u>:

Module I (Full Marks: 25): Participants will be evaluated on the basis of their overall participation and performance in the classroom.

Module II (Full Marks: 25): Participants will be evaluated on the basis of <u>25 Multiple Choice</u> <u>Questions (MSQ-s)</u>, with each question carrying 1 mark.

The minimum percentage for passing each module: 40% or 10 marks (out of 25 marks).

Those who complete the course successfully will be given a Certificate of Completion, issued by the college authority.

Eligibility:

Any student currently enrolled in an Undergraduate Course (3 Year-Honours/ General/ 4 Year-Degree) in Dewan Abdul Gani College is eligible take this course.

Fee Structure:

This course is offered **free** of cost to all enrolled students.

Certificate details:

Upon successful completion of the course, a **Certificate of Completion** <u>issued by Dewan Abdul</u> <u>Gani College</u> will be given to each participant.
